


Jim Gray – January 12, 1944 – January 28, 2007?

- Born in San Francisco, January 12, 1944
 - Married to Loretta (divorced):1 daughter & 3 grandkids; Married to Donna Carnes
 - Missing at sea January 28, 2007
- UC Berkeley; BS (1966) Engineering Mathematics
 PhD (1969) in Programming Languages with Michael Harrison
- IBM (1969 1980)
 - IBM Postdoc at Berkeley (1969-1971)
 - IBM Watson Research, Yorktown Heights (1971) First heard John Cocke pose the problem of scalable computing
 - IBM San Jose Research (1972 1980) Data management, relational systems, transactions, System R, granular database locking, two-tier transaction commit semantics, ACID test for transactions
- Tandem (1980 1990)
 - Cupertino, CA Fault tolerance, NonStop SQL, "five minute rule" for allocating storage, data cube operators, "Why Do Computers Stop and What Can Be Done About It?", Drove industry acceptance of benchmarks (TPC Council 1985)
 - Started HPTS in 1985 with Andreas Reuter and Dieter Gawlick Personally managed whatever it took to make it happen
- DEC (1990 1994)
 - Wrote "Transaction Processing: Concepts & Techniques" with Andreas Reuter (1000 pages)
- Microsoft (1994-2007)
 - TerraServer, "put all the world's data online", scientific large data, much more
- ACM Turing Award (1998):
 - "For seminal contributions to database and transaction processing research and technical leadership in system implementation".



Ed Lassettre - January 16, 1934-November 1, 2015

- Born in Anaconda, Montana in 1934
 - Married to Polly from 1961-2015 (4 kids)
- BS and MS in Mathematics from Ohio State
- IBM (1958 2003)
 - IBM Columbus (1958-1969)
 - IBM Poughkeepsie (1969-1976)
 - IBM Santa Teresa (1976-2003)
 - Appointed IBM Fellow (1987) for work in software architecture and operating systems
 - Team leader, timing & scoring for 1998 Japan Winter Olympics & 2000 Sydney Summer Olympics
- Microsoft, Redmond (2003-2013)
 - High Performance Computing work
 - Retired at age 79
- HPTS:
 - First attended in 1987.
 - Active supporter who worked aggressively to support HPTS
 - Repeatedly called to find out if he could send money to help HPTS

When he could not, and you in essence brought the conference to him, he was deeply moved. And humbled. (I was his test monkey for setting up Skype, so you also gave me one last father-daughter project with him, btw.:)) HPTS meant a lot to him, and it was one of his key contributions of life (poorly worded but I hope you get the sense). I say "life" and not "professional career" because so much of who my father was, was tied up with what he "did".

Thank you again for remembering my father, while he was still here as well as after. I was deeply touched to find a mention and link to his obit soon after his passing: 'the king is gone but not forgotten', in the words of Neil Young.
